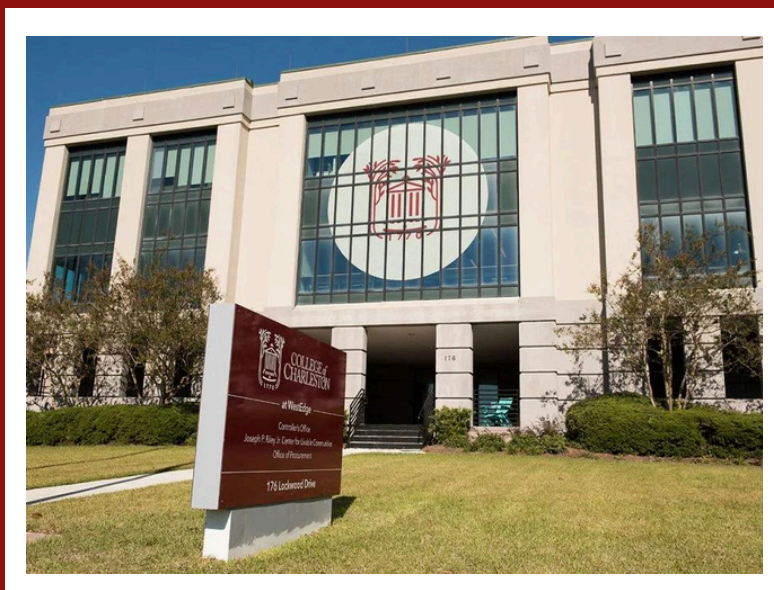


Advisory Board

SPOTLIGHT: Union Pier

From June 2023 to March 2024, the Riley Center team led a community-driven public engagement process on behalf of the State Ports Authority (SPA), related to the development of Union Pier, a 70-acre property along Charleston’s peninsular waterfront. Our largest project to date, Riley Center team members recruited more than 70 volunteers, including a 14-member Stakeholder Advisory Committee and a Community Advisory Council comprised of more than 50 representatives from local nonprofit organizations, community groups, and neighborhood associations. Additionally, the Riley Center commissioned a team of world-renowned design consultants led by Sasaki, a globally recognized award-winning design firm based out of Boston.

Together, the team members and volunteers engaged directly with around 1,000 community members through meetings and events and indirectly with nearly 5,000 community members through the Union Pier interactive website. In March, the Riley Center’s role concluded with a culminating report outlining the effort, along with community feedback and research findings related to the site and its redevelopment.

SPOTLIGHT: Gullah Geechee Heritage Preservation Project



The Gullah Geechee Heritage Preservation Project is a collaborative initiative focused on preserving historic Gullah Geechee and African American ancestral communities and their cultural sites. Funded by the Historic Preservation Fund’s Underrepresented Communities Grant Program and supported by the City of Charleston, the Preservation Society of Charleston, Charleston County, the Town of Mt. Pleasant and the Riley Center, the project aims to document and protect significant sites, assist with formal recognition, and foster sustainable partnerships for ongoing preservation efforts.



SPOTLIGHT: Riley Mayors' Design Fellowship



In February of 2024, the Riley Center hosted its sixth year of the Riley Mayors' Design Fellowship. The program is held in partnership with Clemson University, the Municipal Association of SC, and the SC Arts Commission.

Mayors from across South Carolina were paired with Clemson graduate students and experts in landscape architecture and downtown revitalization to address an issue or a proposed project in their town or city.

Also this year, thanks to generous donations by the Municipal Association of South Carolina and a number of mayors across South Carolina, the Riley Mayors' Design Fellowship will be endowed for many years to come!



SPOTLIGHT: Athenian Program 2024

The Athenian Program found a new home with The Riley Center this year! The program is a premier leadership development opportunity for senior level public sector executives, providing an opportunity to delve into major challenges at this stage in their careers.

Fifteen local government leaders from around the United States, plus a design team of distinguished public sector executives, gathered in Lake City, SC for a week of training, empowerment and fellowship.
